We are going to lose a couple of the beautiful old trees in our cemetery. Our wonderfully vigilant cemetery board called in an arborist who has determined these particular trees are at the end of their lifespan, and it is time to take them down before they fall on their own and do damage. The board is handling the tree removal well, all the details are taken care of, but the conversation around taking the trees down has been somber—it's a sad thing to think o flossing these trees.

As I look out my office window every day watching the leaves slowly turn for what I know will be the last time on these majestic old trees, it strikes me that every year this tree has prepared for its death. Every year the sap pulls back, every year the leaves turn color and fall to the ground, every year the empty branches stretch into a cold winter sky. Every year this tree practices death.

The two trees that we will lose are some of the trees planted by the confirmation class of 1887. As these youth prepared for their confirmation they planted these trees as a way to beautify the grounds of their church. Year after year they watched as these trees grew, changed their colors, and shed their leaves. Year after year they watched as the trees died their fall deaths. Now many of these confirmands, I'm sure, lay at rest in the shade of the trees they planted as they affirmed their faith so many years ago.

But, the trees don't stay dead. Each year as the weather warms new buds spring forth. New leaves unfurl, and new life touches each of these trees. The trees in our cemetery are not simply a reminder of mortality and death—they are a reminder of the resurrection promised to each of us in Christ. Just as the trees receive new leaves each spring, each of the individuals laid to rest in our cemetery is given new life in Christ.

Yes, the trees are a very fitting symbol to have in our cemetery, and it is sad to lose two of them. As I look out my window, though, I can also see two smaller trees in the lineup. Though they are not necessarily small trees, they are dwarfed by those around them. But that's just because they are newer. They were planted when we lost some of the other, older trees in the line. As they grow they will fill in the spaces left by the trees they replaced—and we will plant new trees to fill in for those we will lose this season too. Just like the forest, the church goes on. And in Christ we trust that life will always go on.

So this year as you watch the leaves turn and fall, thank God for the gift of life given to each of us—life on earth and eternal life with God. And give thanks too for those gnarly old giants in the faith that helped you grow when your faith was smaller.

Voices of Fish Lake—Michelle Young

Complete emptiness. Nothing. Helpless. Never had I felt so alone and so adrift as I did right then. Just a mere few hours before, I had taken my son to his pediatrician--sure she would give us some magic medicine to end his sudden onset of headaches, dizziness, vomiting. Instead, my husband and I found ourselves at Children's Hospital with our four year old, immediately admitted after an MRI showed a brain tumor--a tumor that they were unsure what it exactly was and what it all meant. All we knew for sure was it had to come out as soon as possible, after steroids helped decrease the inflammation and the medical team could all meet and devise a plan and secure a room for the many hour surgery. And all that brought me to where I was...alone with my sleeping son in the middle of the night in his hospital room. I had sent my husband home to care for our other two toddlers--he would return in the morning. In the meantime, I sat, unable to sleep or do much of anything. And that's where the desperation began to set in. In the past, I had never had much trouble praying to God, though looking back now, I realize life had been pretty easy for my first 31 years. My "prayers" were pretty embarrassing in retrospect--"God, let us win this game," "God, please let me do well on this test," "If there's one thing I need, God, it's nice weather on my wedding day!" Now, when I felt that I needed God more than ever before, I was too overwhelmed, emotional, exhausted. Nothing came to me. I couldn't pray. This made everything so much worse, and sleep evaded me that entire night. The sun eventually rose, and the despair I felt was enormous. I was burdened beyond anything I had ever experienced before. My son awoke, and his little four year old self was oblivious to anything being wrong with me. I pasted on a smile and turned on cartoons for him to watch on ty. Just then, thankfully, my pastor arrived at the hospital. After greeting us, he simply sat down and asked me, "What can I do for you?" It all came out...the almost desperate feelings I was having...I couldn't find words. Prayer wouldn't come. When I needed God the most, when He was the only one who could truly make a difference, I was incapable of talking to Him. The conversation that followed was one I will never forget. We talked about Romans 8:26--in part, "the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groaning too deep for words." Words are not required when we pray to God--he understands what your heart feels and your soul needs. The thoughts and feelings we cannot express in human words are conveyed. The Spirit creates the connection from us to God and the content of our

communication. Though still exhausted and overwhelmed and stressed, just repeating this bible verse over and over to myself seemed to lift a ton of bricks off my shoulders. In the end, Will's surgery--all 12 plus hours of it with two pediatric neurosurgeons trading off operating--was a success. Though there were lingering effects of it for many years, he became a competitive gymnast, a pianist and a tuba player in the school band, a varsity football player, a college graduate, a Peace Corps volunteer. However, situations in the almost 30 years that followed haven't always worked out so well for me--my mom and brother being diagnosed with cancer and dying six months apart, friends who encountered serious physical and mental health conditions, broken relationships, and so on. And there have been many times where I desperately needed to pray to God and words wouldn't come. However, those feelings of pure despair from being unable to articulate my thoughts have not occurred again. "Likewise, the Spirit helps us in our weakness for we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groaning too deep for words.

Renewing Hope - Restoring Lives Amborella House was founded in 2017 with the goal of providing emergency shelter and transitional housing for women who have been rescued from sex trafficking and sexual exploitation, women who need a place to escape "the life" and redeem their future in a safe, nurturing and faith-based environment.

Sex Trafficking Realities

It is said the average lifespan of a female, once engaged in prostitution, is seven years.

The average age of entry for minors is 12-14 years old. The average of Adult women entering into prostitution is 17-19 years of age. 60-90% of survivors are without safe housing. Without safe housing they often return to "the life".

83% of sex trafficking are victims of assault with a deadly weapon. The Minnesota Attorney General reported "a six-month study by local prosecutors found over 34,000 advertisements posted online for sex in the Twin Cities but sex trafficking is not just a Twin Cities problem. Trafficking affects people from all parts of Minnesota.

Amborella House Services

When the doors of Amborella House open, in September 2019, they will provide transitional housing for rescued women from 30 days to three years (with an 18-month average stay). The house will provide a safe and supportive environment for women to begin to heal, achieve a sense of safety and stability, develop independent living skills, and provide renewed hope for their lives, all in preparation for life outside of Amborella House. Services will include:

24/7 Onsite and Trained Staff Safe and Secure Living Environment, Case Management by Qualified Staff Members, Professional Individual and Group Therapy, Basic Life Skills Education GED Tutoring and Test Preparation Career Readiness Coaching Links, to Healthcare and Legal Services, Sensitive, Compassionate Faith-Based Care, Other Services as Needs Arise.

Trip to our sister church Wasa – July 2019 Noel Petit

For the first time, Bega Kwa Bega gathered a group of singers for a choir to travel to Tanzania. Most of the choir came from Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church in Apple Valley, but there were a few of us from other churches to make up the 21 singers. Mark Ertl, Shepherd's Music Director, led us in 3 practices over the spring. We spent two weeks in Iringa in mid-July – singing at 6 different churches with a native choir of about 25. The trip included a safari to Ruhaha National Park. I continue to encourage folks to travel to Africa and visit Iringa. The people are wonderful and the scenery incredible

I spent a day visiting our sister church in Wasa, Tanzania. Wasa is a small town of a few hundred folks surrounded by many small villages. The drive to Wasa is a comfortable 2 hour drive from Iringa along significantly improved roads. Wasa's Pastor Amidu Msungu knew of the choir and even had visited one of our concerts. The congregation welcomed me along with Nixon Mwitula (one of the synod's outreach pastors) and the regional pastor. After tea, we worshiped in the new church (in the past 4 years), had a congregational meeting and lunch. The Wasa church includes 6 preaching points in nearby communities. Lacking easy transportation, the preaching points provide worship services across the region. Most of the preaching point congregations are 20 or so members and Pastor Msungu supervises the evangelists at each point.

Next to the church, construction continues on the Pastor's house. With local and synod support, the house rises to accommodate a pastor and his family in this very rural area. So far, the house is foundation, walls and a roof. Still needed to complete the home are floors, windows, doors, plumbing (though the outhouse is under construction) and electricity. I have pictures of the church and pastor's house on Facebook. I encourage you to see how much progress has been made in Wasa in the past dozen or so years. My visit

included donations to each of the evangelists and to Pastor Msungu. The synod also brought books for the evangelists and pastor on sermons, worship services and teaching young people.

Thanks to members of Fish Lake Lutheran for your dedication to our BKB partnership. Our Pastors Mwituala and Msungu read the greeting card to the congregation. Wasa church thanks all of you for your prayers, thoughts and donations to this growing congregation.

Cemetery Board Announcement

The Cemetery Board does periodic assessments of conditions around the church and cemetery grounds. We recently consulted with Xtreme Tree Service regarding the condition of storm damaged trees near the back of the cemetery and also a few mature trees around the cemetery and church. Based on this assessment, the Cemetery Board procured a bid from Xtreme Tree Service to remove some established trees that are at risk of falling and causing damage, along with some maintenance/pruning of a few others. Upon reviewing the bid and the risks involved, the board has opted to accept this bid and proceed. This decision was not taken lightly. As hard as it is to see a few of our larger maple trees go, the expense of acting now (while still significant) would potentially be much greater should these trees fall on their own and damage either the cemetery or the church. The Cemetery Board will bear the cost of the effort, including trees on the church grounds. Work is tentatively scheduled to begin around mid-October.

Year of Renewal 1-to-1 Conversations Recap

This summer Fish Lake has been participating in the first stage of the St. Paul Area Synod's Year of Renewal Program. The Year of Renewal is an intentional program focusing on three Great Listenings – Listening to God, Listening to One Another, and Listening to our Community. We have been working on Listening to God with the leaves we place weekly on the vine in the sanctuary space. Feel free to check out the vine and read some of the ways that God has been active in the lives of the people in our congregation. And don't forget to add your leaf every week during worship (or whenever you find yourself at the church).

The second of the Great Listenings we have been working on this summer is Listening to One Another. The Year of Renewal Committee, along with several volunteers recruited from the congregation, have been sitting down to have 1 to 1 Conversations with members of our congregation. The goal of the conversations is to listen to the person's story, to hear what's truly important to them, and to gather all the reports together (in confidence) to see if we can find any themes in what we have heard. A big thanks to our Year of Renewal Committee, as well as to Michelle Young, LaDonna Olson, Jerome Huselid, Lisa Nephew, Sue Kane, Candy McCauley, and Patty Ricke for contacting members and having these conversations!

All those who had conversations gathered on August 28^{th} to share what they had heard. The major thing that was shared was that people loved having a space opened to be listened to. It is not often in our busy world that someone takes an hour of their time just to listen to someone else – and that time was much appreciated. Other things we learned –

- The culture of Fish Lake is appreciated people feel like family
- There is a feeling that maybe Fish Lake is doing too much, and that the same volunteers are doing so much they get burned out
- There is a hunger for service opportunities
- Many in times of transition are hungry for support from their Fish Lake family
- The youth opportunities are quality and much appreciated
- There is a call for a specifically men's ministry type of gathering

We have gathered much data from these conversations! If you are interested in talking we do still have people willing to do 1 to 1 Conversations, just call the office and we will get you set up! The next step in the Year of Renewal process is to being the Listening to the Community piece (while still continuing the Listening to God). The Year of Renewal Committee will gather with the other congregations in this process on Saturday, October 12. Please keep this committee, and the Fish Lake family, in your prayers as we work through this Year of Renewal.
